Principal's Message for St. Francis Xavier:



We are very excited for our year at St. Francis Xavier School. Once again there have been many changes at St. Francis over the summer and we are excited to welcome many new staff and students to our school. This year we are welcoming 2 new teachers; Mr. Boyd Block, who will be teaching our grade 5/6 class, and Ms. Kennedy Werre, who is our Grade 4/5 teacher and academy lead teacher. Mr. Block is coming to us after 9 years at Notre Dame Academy where he was the Golf Academy instructor and has been with our school division for nearly 20 years. He is looking forward to this new challenge. Ms. Werre is new to the teaching profession this year. She has just finished 5 years at the Medicine Hat College where she was a standout basketball player, having been named the most valuable player multiple times, and the ACAC Female Athlete of the Year. We are very excited to have our new staff joining us for this school year to work alongside our

returning teachers; Ms. Rhonda Gregus in Grade 1/2, Ms. Stephanie Van Ieperen in Kindergarten, and Ms. Rachel Folk in our Grade 2/3 classroom and our lead music instructor.

We are of course excited to be introducing the St. FX Sports Academy and Excellence program this school year. After a year of hard work and planning our grade 4 -6 students will have the choice of joining either the St. FX Sports Academy or the Excellence Program. These programs will operate on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons. Students in the Sports Academy will explore a wide variety of physical activities targeting improved physical literacy and academic achievement. Our Excellence Program students will have the chance to explore their passions and learn a variety of new skills including robotics, photography, and editing our school yearbook. This is an exciting time to be a student at St. FX!

I am humbled to have the opportunity to continue to serve as the Principal of St. Francis Xavier School. It is a blessing to have such wonderful staff and support services available to us. School Profile

St. Francis Xavier School is one of two Catholic elementary schools in Crescent Heights. We have a student population of 105 students in Kindergarten to Grade Six and an additional 19 students enrolled in our community Early Learning Program (12 of these students are also enrolled in our Kindergarten program). This year we are offering an optional sports academy for our grade 4 -6 students and will have a school wide focus on physical literacy.

Why a School Education Plan?

Continuous improvement is an expectation within our schools. Planning and reporting processes at the school level are essential for focusing efforts to improve the quality of education provided to students. Each year schools complete an annual plan. School plans focus on the strategic priorities of the District and align with the Provincial Annual Education Results Report (AERR).

The Medicine Hat Catholic Board of Education held a Strategic Planning session. The Strategic Planning session provided an opportunity for stakeholders to review the vision, mission, values, and to articulate the strategic priorities for the district. Representatives from stakeholder groups included trustees, senior administration, central office staff, and school based administration.

Based on the responses, the stakeholder groups brainstormed possible themes. The information collected was used to develop *District Strategic Priorities*.
